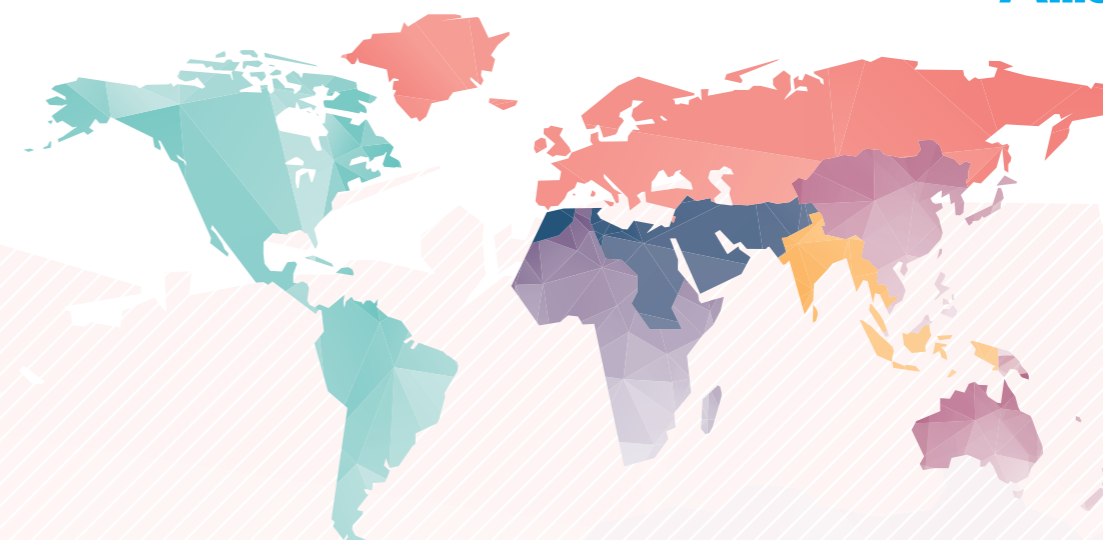


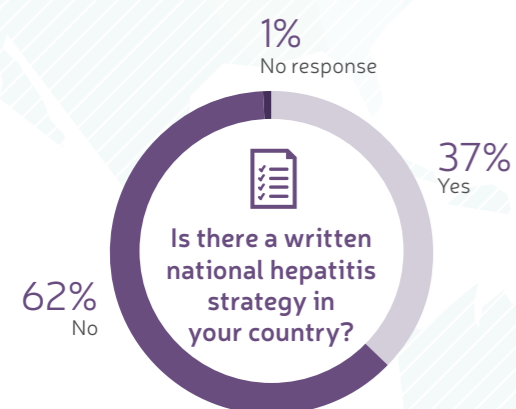
# Strengthening communications between governments and civil society will advance the global response to viral hepatitis

Almost **50% of the civil society organisations** reported their governments gave inaccurate responses to  $\geq 5$  of 25 WHO 2013 survey items

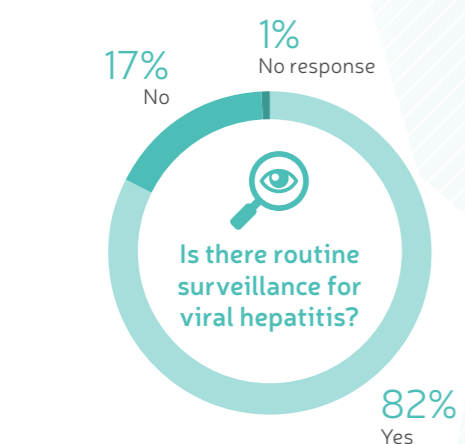

## Civil Society Organisation Responses



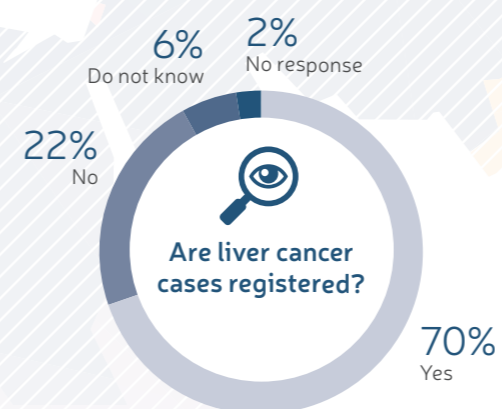
**Nearly 1 in 5...**  
 ...civil society organisations **disagreed** with their governments as to whether a national strategy was in place.



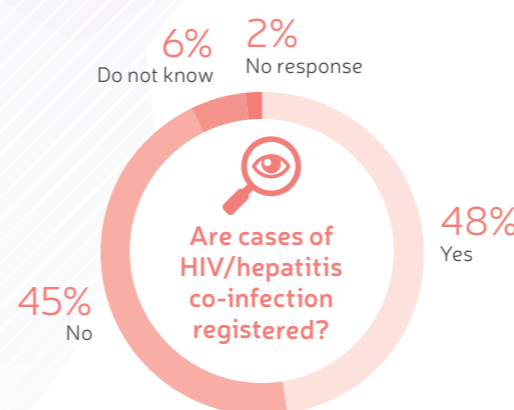
**Over a quarter...**

**One third...**  
 ...of the civil society organisations **disagreed** with their governments as to whether HIV/hepatitis co-infection cases were being registered.
